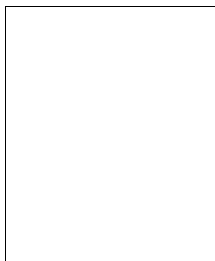

Following the enormous financial success of this year's Secret Gardens event, the committee took the decision to make £1,000 available to Winster village organisations. This information was advertised in The Village Magazine and application forms had to be returned by 12 noon on Thursday November 30th to allow decisions to be taken at that evening's meeting and for the results to be notified to applicants by December 8th. The application form was made available in two formats; as a computer download and a traditional paper copy. Five applications were received, 3 using paper forms and two printed from the computer download. Grants were made to all those who had applied for funding from the £1,000 allocation:

This year's Christmas trees can be left outside your property on the day of the green bin collections in December and January. If your tree is over 5 feet long, please cut it into 5 foot lengths or it will not be taken.

This arrangement applies even if you don't have a green bin. So that will be the day after re-cycling/blue box day

West Bank Traffic problems

An open meeting of twenty one West Bank residents was held at the Burton Institute on 23rd November to discuss the problems of traffic on West Bank, Winsters. It is generally considered that both the volume and speed of traffic has increased significantly in recent times and that this is increasing the risk of accidents to vehicles, pedestrians and property.

Among concerns were the heavy lorries ignoring the 3Tonne weight limit and that the weight limit is actually to be increased to 7.5Tonnes. Cars and vans are driven too fast on such a narrow steep road which has two blind bends. Parked cars cause problems on the bends. Pedestrians are at great risk on the road leading to the Burton Institute.

The problem is part of a whole village problem and is shared by villages such as Wensley, Darley Bridge and Two Dales. Commuters using the roads through Winsters at peak hours cause most problems and it was thought that satellite navigation systems may be adding to this.

Various solutions were suggested. The Winsters bypass and gates on the road, although perhaps desirable, were considered to be impractical!! It was agreed that more information and advice was needed and wider consultation within Winsters and with other villages with similar problems would help. Working with the Parish Council, DCC and the Police is likely to be the best way forward.

Next meeting is to be held in the Burton Institute at **7.30pm on Thursday 18th January**. Any non West Bankers who would like to express an opinion are welcome!

Healthy Start

The Welfare Food Scheme has been replaced by a new scheme called Healthy Start which provides vouchers that can be exchanged for liquid cow's milk, fresh fruit, fresh vegetables or infant formula milk. It also provides free vitamin supplements. The scheme is open to pregnant women (once they are ten weeks pregnant) and children under four years old in families on Income Support, income-based Jobseeker's Allowance or Child Tax Credit. It is also open to all pregnant women under 18.

Those who qualify for the vouchers will receive one voucher per week, worth £2.80 for each child/pregnancy. Children under one year old will receive two vouchers, worth a total of £5.60.

All enclosed public places and workplaces will become smoke free from **1st July 2007**.

About North Derbyshire Stop Smoking Service:

The service organises weekly clinics for a period of seven weeks aimed at smokers wanting to quit. An experienced team of friendly specialist advisers provides free support and advice at the clinics and if appropriate, Nicotine Replacement Therapy or Zyban can be arranged on prescription. Further support after the initial seven weeks is also available if needed. From 1st April 2005 to the 31st March 2006 records show that 75% of all smokers supported by specialist advisers from North Derbyshire Stop Smoking Service managed to quit successfully.

Helen Louise Lyon Trust

The Helen Louise Lyon Trust is a local charity which provides assistance to people with an incurable illness to give them the choice to stay in their own home. The Trust was conceived as a tribute to Helen Louise Lyon who was able to stay in her home, in the Hope Valley, due to the help and support of family, friends and health professionals.

Due to a successful funding application, Helen's Trust can now offer its help to patients registered at the GP practice of Darley Dale, Youlgreave and Winstler. This now increases the number of people which Helen's Trust can help by a further 9,000 patients.

The Trust endeavours to fund whatever is needed to help someone stay in their home, for example nursing care, sitters, complementary therapy, help to run the home or hire of medical equipment. This is provided at no cost to the individual or their family, but we do ask that all statutory services (e.g. social services, health, Macmillan, Marie Curie) are approached for help first. The Trust also offers complementary therapy sessions for individuals with an incurable illness, and their carers, at Newholme Hospital.

Helen's Trust has a very hardworking Fundraising Committee, run by volunteers, who carry out such events as a Clay Pigeon Shoot, Fashion Show, Classical Concert, Golf Day, and Ballet in conjunction with the Chatsworth Estate.

In addition, the **Friends of Helen's Trust** provides an opportunity for individuals to support the Trust with an annual donation of. Friends receive a newsletter and advance notification of Helen's Trust events.

Helen's Trust has benefited from fantastic local support, and appreciates any contribution. Could you help by organising a coffee morning, pub quiz, or other event?

Car Parking in Matlock

During the construction of Sainsbury's and the A6 Relief Road the car park closure mainly affects the pay and display site. The pay and display car park at Matlock Bridge is now closed and will remain closed, as this is on the line of the new A6 Relief Road. Motorists who have purchased season tickets for parking there have been offered the nearby Artist Corner as an alternative, until the new public car park is built. Derbyshire Dales suggest that visitors to the town also make use of this car park (particularly those who make use of the Residents Free Parking Concession badge), as it is only a short walk from the centre of the town.

The free Station car park will remain open for parking during the period of the construction works, although it will be limited to around 150 spaces from 8th January onwards.

In March/April Derbyshire Dales will take possession of a newly constructed 200 space car park, alongside the station, and at that time will lose the free parking.

Just a reminder that there are 10 buses a day from Winster to Matlock and that anyone aged 60 + can travel free (after 9.30) with their (free) Gold Card

Waste free cooking

Don't forget to recycle your Christmas cards, but please don't put cards with glitter, plastic etc in your green bin. These can be taken to: Station Car Park, Matlock; Town Hall, Matlock Granby Road Car Park, Bakewell; Spar Store, Dale Road South, Darley Dale between 4 and 31 January.

Old mobile phones can be recycled at any District Council offices or Leisure Centres. Please include the battery and charger, but remove the SIM card.

Working for West Derbyshire

Councillor's Corner John Moseley

It's been 7 months since the *majority* of you gave me the pleasure of becoming your district councillor. A few words on the experience so far.

After the excitement of the election and count, papers were signed, congratulations dished out, and...well...very little else. Fortunately, though it didn't seem so at the time, my first fully fledged meeting was as a member of the planning committee with an Enthovens application high on the agenda. After discussions with Enthovens, council planning officers and the Highways Department it fell to me to open the debate. Was I articulate, eloquent and concise or red, sweaty and bumbling? I can't remember now. Any how, the upshot was highway conditions attached to the planning approval, a front page quote in *The Derbyshire Times*, and a certain realisation of what I had let myself in for.

As yet, planning is the main committee upon which I sit and on the whole I feel I have quietly weighed up the arguments and voted accordingly. Two applications for the installation of solar panels have been the exception to this. Whilst believing they should be passed I have voted against on the assertion that we should uphold present council policy and look to change it for future applications. With a little more consideration it now seems to be in our hands, as councillors, to change policy by voting against it.

As an observation, Councillor Nick Elliott, highlighted a particular irony regarding this issue when debating a proposal in Cromford. Whilst it was argued we must dismiss this application for solar panels on the grounds that they neither conserved nor enhanced the area, it could perhaps better be argued that this form of renewable energy actually complemented the area with its previous renewable energy – water power – central to its designation as a World Heritage Site in the first place.

At the monthly full council meetings, on the whole, most proposals are adopted after debate, with a clear majority. One particular exception to this was when it was proposed to take away both parish and town councils power to insist that planning applications went before committee if they had any kind of objection. This, it was argued, would improve efficiency of the system, thus allowing the authority to hit government targets and increase revenue. Three councillors argued very eloquently against the proposal and then abstained from the vote. I voted against and it was defeated by 12 votes to 10. Had I voted for, then it would have gone through with the chairs casting vote. So in some small way I have begun to contribute to the democratic process.

These examples aside the past few months have been an interesting and enjoyable learning curve. Whilst it is satisfaction enough to have an element of the Elton youth salute me respectfully as I drive by, I hope that after this period of acclimatisation I can better use my position for the good of the whole ward. Only time will tell...
