POULTRY NOTES by EB

All the hens are laying very well but this sometimes leads to the hens excreting calcium from their vents which will stick to their feathers.

It is best to cut off the calcium with scissors. The shell goes on last in the laying process, hence the leak of calcium.

If a hen starts to look "seedy" and drinks a lot of water, this may be that she has eaten something indigestible and it has stuck in her crop and has fermented. Gentle pressure upwards on the crop can make the hen sick, expelling the noxious contents. Then she should be given two charcoal pills, obtained from a good shop selling herbs, and all should be well.

Wine Notes

Once the wine has been poured, check the colour of the wine at the rim of the glass, you can do this by tilting the glass in front of a white tissue or piece of cloth this will give you your first impressions of the wine. (Red Wine) Is it bright red, or even clear, this would suggest youth, or has it turned a dark and vivid brick red with age. (White Wine) is it transparent or light yellow or greenish denoting youthfulness, or has it grown golden with age, as many of us.

The majority of what we can learn about the wine is always revealed from the scent or bouquet. Bring the glass close to your nose and inhale deeply, your first impressions are definitely the most important when the nostril is clear from other odours. Does the wine smell of fresh grapes or fruit (Youthful) or does it have an metallic," foreign", "wrong" smell (Off) or does it have rich, full bodied intense and complex flavour from age in the barrel or bottle. Last can you identify the grape? (to be continued)

WINSTER PRE-SCHOOL OFSTED REPORT UPDATE



Congratulations!!!

Just recently Winster Pre-School underwent an Ofsted Inspection.

Our report was brilliant. Overall the inspection marked us as good: the provision is strong.

Villagers should be immensely proud of their Village Pre-School and staff are to be commended for their work.

Some of the key points were as follows:

ORGANISATION: Staff could not have been praised more - they are vigilant, interaction is good between staff and children, they are sensitive, join in well, are observant, provide quality care and education, engage well, introduce new words, value and respect each child, praise and encourage to promote self esteem, have appropriate qualifications.

HELPING CHILDREN TO BE HEALTHY: Children's health is well supported by good hygiene routines and a healthy eating policy is operated with activities including the cooking or preparation of food. Planned physical exercise is part of each session.

HELPING CHILDREN STAY SAFE: Children learn how to avoid accidental injury through discussion, with visits recently from both the lolly-pop lady and fire service. Children are well supervised and there is a good range of toys and quality equipment.

HELPING CHILDREN ACHIEVE WELL: The interaction between staff and children is very positive, they benefit from well organized familiar routines supporting learning through play. Each child has a key worker ensuring effective monitoring of child's development and welfare. Personal independence is nurtured and children know how to behave and listen carefully to instructions.

NURSERY EDUCATION: The quality of learning and teaching is good with children making consistent progress. Staff planning is good and supports activities that capture a child's imagination whilst being challenging. Staff engage in child play and work well as a team. Focused activities promote certain areas of development. Children achieve well in speaking and listening. They are interested in books and encouraged to take one home.

GARDENING NOTES by EB

What a blessing to have a dry period allowing weeding and digging to take place without damaging the soil structure.

Now seed sowing can carry on. One word of warning: clean out any water butts, giving them a good scrub. When there is debris at the bottom, this can be the cause of "damping off" of seedlings if dirty water is used. I try to use tap water, using water from the household kettle. To be on the safe side, I use Cheshunt Compound added to the water which prevents the troubles that can occur losing little seedlings.

I have sown *Nicotiana Sylvestris*, one of my favourite bedding out plants because of its scent and height (3-4ft) and because the scent comes in the evening. It is fertilised by moths. Another lovely scented plant which flowers early in spring until summer is *Coronilla Glauca* which has yellow flowers and smells of vanilla. It is a shrub and it likes a sunny position.

Carrying on with scent, I love *Viburnum Burkwoodii* and *Viburnum Bitchiuense* which flower through the late winter. Both will grow in odd corners of the garden and do not need much attention – no pruning.

Finish pruning the roses. I just take out the dead wood and any branches that are crossing. This results in earlier flowering.

Now that the early flowering bulbs are over, this is a good chance to split up patches of crocus and snowdrops "in the green". Have you thought about growing summer snowflake, *Leucojum Verna*, which is like a tall snowdrop but really likes damp conditions and seeds itself very quickly?

Give some fertiliser to all climbers, roses and clematis. When I plant new clematis, I like to grow them through a clay land-drain. Always plant the roots deeper than you think and pull the stems up through the land-drain. Then you can put slug pellets in the drain and no fear of birds or hedgehogs getting the poisoned slugs. Also this planting prevents clematis wilt and rabbits. Try to keep a diary of gardening activities, especially when and where you apply fertilisers.

I find when using bone meal that at first it doesn't affect my skin, but in subsequent years, when weeding without gloves, I get a skin complaint that needs cortisone to get rid of it. Therefore take care!

I have a friend who was very disappointed with the bulbs she planted last autumn. Very few came up, eaten by mice. I find new bulbs are best grown in containers the first year and then planted out the following autumn. I think this is because of the fungicide used by the bulb growers in the packets. This must smell very attractive to small rodents, but the smell wears off by the next season.

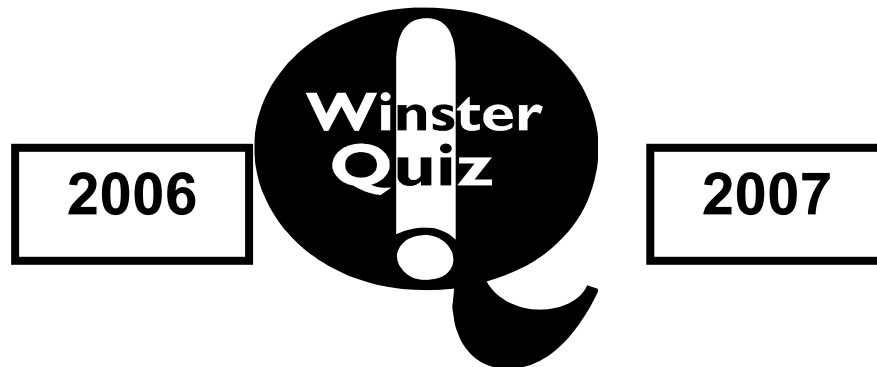

A Green Budget

The Budget responds to the Stern Review on the Economics of Climate Change and sets out the next stage in the Government's strategy for tackling climate change both domestically and globally, including:

- that the Government will launch a competition to develop the UK's first full-scale demonstration of carbon capture and storage, the result of which will be announced next year;
- an increase in fuel duty rates of 2 pence per litre (ppl) from 1 October 2007, and increases in the next two years of 2ppl and 1.84ppl respectively;
- announcing car vehicle excise duty rates for the next three years, including rates for the most polluting cars rising to £400 and rates for clean cars in band B falling to £35;
- a review to examine the vehicle and fuel technologies which over the next 25 years could help 'decarbonise' road transport;
- a package of measures to support biofuels including extending the 20 pence per litre biofuels duty differential to 2009-10;
- a rise in climate change levy rates from 1 April 2008 in line with current inflation;
- that from 1 October 2007 all new zero-carbon homes costing up to £500,000 will pay no stamp duty, with zero-carbon homes costing in excess of £500,000 receiving a reduction in their stamp duty bill of £15,000;
- an intention that, by the end of the next decade, all householders will have been offered help to introduce energy efficient measures with the aim that, where practicably possible, all homes will have achieved their cost-effective energy efficiency potential;
- increasing funds available through the Low Carbon Buildings Programme to a total of over £18 million to help meet the demand from households for microgeneration technologies; and
- a £800 million international window for the Environmental Transformation Fund to finance overseas development projects that deliver both poverty reduction and environmental benefits in developing countries.

The Budget also reports on the Government's strategy for tackling other environmental challenges including:

- an increase from 1 April 2008 in the standard rate of the landfill tax by £8 a tonne per year, until at least 2010-11; and an increase in the lower rate of the landfill tax from £2 per tonne to £2.50 per tonne from 1 April 2008; and
- an increase in the aggregates levy rate to £1.95 per tonne from 1 April 2008.

I was delighted to get a phone call a couple of weeks back from someone in the village chasing me up for news I'd promised about the polyfilm recycling - and here it is:

Derbyshire Dales Council have kindly donated us a wheelie bin for our plastic film recycling. Steve Flitter, the Village Shop Manager, has found space for it



down the alley on the right hand side of the shop and you can find it between the metal trolleys and the large rubbish bin. It's for everyone's use so please start putting your plastic film waste in it - it's good for the environment and good for the shop, since it'll help when we start applying for funding for the shop refurbishment. I'll be emptying the bin regularly and Lesley Lax will be taking the plastic to the recycling company for us on one of her regular trips to Norwich. As you can see, the bin's a bit sad-looking and has seen some heavy action in its short life (even the dog posing

on top looks miserable, though that might be because she's scared of heights*), so what I'd really like is to brighten the bin up and customise it. Are there any potential street artists out there (any age) who would like to paint it? So, what can you put in the bin?

- ✓ polythene film (usually slightly stretchy and slightly opaque)
- ✓ plastic bags (but not carrier bags as these are better re-used than recycled)
- ✓ magazine and mailing wrap (printed/coloured is fine, but please remove all labels)

But NOT

- X cellophane (sounds crackly when squashed e.g. wrapping from flower bouquets)
- X degradable plastic bags (usually marked as such)
- X plastic bottles or trays of any kind
- X any food residues, sticky labels, sellotape or tags
