Winster remembers its war dead ~ compiled by David Frederickson

Harold Foxlow: To the roll of our Winster boys who have laid down their lives for their country we sincerely regret to add the name of Private Harold Foxlow, who voluntarily enlisted in the 2nd Notts & Derbyshire Regiment. He was killed in action in France on April 18th, 1917 aged 22 years. He was the son of Samuel and Grace Foxlow of Winster and was very much respected by all who knew him. He was a member of the Church choir and also prominently connected with Winster Rifle Club, being proud of his shooting medal, which he always carried with him. He is buried in Vermelles British Military Cemetery, France.

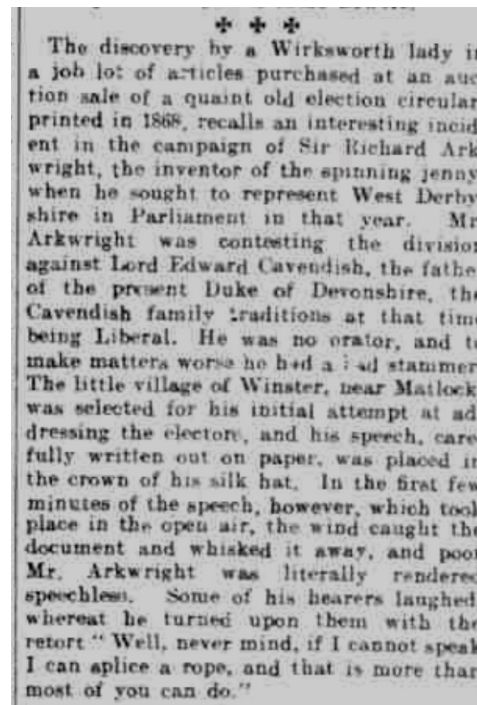
Historic Newspaper Archive

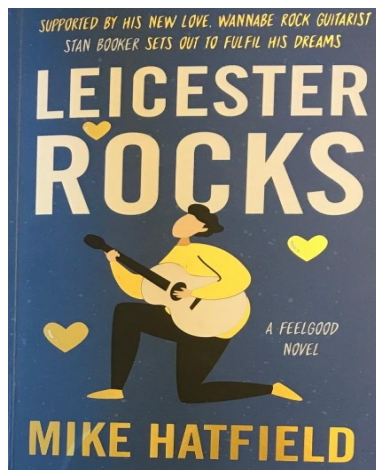

Dad's Non-Moving Train Adventure

In his life he has been a bus conductor, fruit machine mender, Armature Rewinder, Peak Park Ranger, Holiday Fellowship Walks Leader, The Witch, He might have been in the Guisers, but you will never know the true identity of those characters! It was about four years ago that he was diagnosed with vascular dementia. Dad was never one for keeping secrets, so, as a family, we decided to create a blog on Dad's Dementia Adventures.

Dad loves his steam trains. His favourite jigsaw is the one with the flying Scotsman. He always picks it over the hundreds of other jigsaws he has. For ages he has been asking to go on a train. Its difficult to judge how much out of routine he can cope with, without getting overly anxious. And then there are toileting issues to. However Mum and I decided to try out the Ecclesbourne Valley Railway on a day when he could see a steam train. Off we all went, my husband too. Dad in the front so he could see where we were going. As soon as we were in the car the questions started. "Where are we going? Do you know the way? Is it far? Are we all going? Where are we going? Have we got enough money? Is it far? Do we have time? Where are we going? Is it far? Do you know the way?"

Just take a deep breath and keep answering them.

At the station Dad seems unsure of why we are there. After talking to the sales reception we go over the platform to the stationary restaurant car. Get teas and twirls and a kitkat. Walk down the carriage and get Dad to sit down. This all takes time, encouragement and lots of holding hands.

Dad then is a bit confused.

"Will it move?"

We try to move him off the restaurant car in time for the timetabled steam train to arrive. This almost goes smoothly, then Dad announced that he needs a wee.

"Can you hear the train."

Dad looks confused and a bit nonplussed.

Fortunately the train came round the corner

"A real moving train" says Dad!

The Winstor Wobble

Hello! I'm Christina Bradstreet. My partner, Richard Beales and I moved onto East Bank last month, with our baby, Lucy Iris (born 2 April). Do say hello if you see me around the village, teal-hooded pram careering downhill to the shop, or as I huff and puff, pushing it back up again!

I am an art historian working for the National Gallery, London, where I organise, host, and teach online courses and adult learning events relating to the nation's paintings. Keen to keep the little grey cells alive while on maternity leave, I'm typing this article one-handed, while simultaneously

feeding the little one! I've affectionately named this column 'The Winstor Wobble' - a term Richard and I devised for moments of doubt in the run-up to our move, in the face of the seemingly seismic changes involved with up-sticking to Derbyshire from East Grinstead in West Sussex. (Now we are here, the wobbles appear to have stopped!)

The Winstor Wobble sounds like a dance that the village Morris Dancers might adopt, and on the theme of dance, this article explores a pastel sketch by Degas of Ukrainian folk dancers, c.1899. It's a less-well known work in the National Gallery's collection, acquired for the nation as a gift from the Sara Lee Corporation in 1998. Degas is of course known for his pastels of ballet dancers on stage or rehearsing at the Paris Opéra, where he spent many hours looking and sketching. However, he seems also to have sketched Eastern European folk-dance troupes as they performed at venues such as the Moulin Rouge, the Folies-Bergère and the Casino de Paris. He may even have watched a short film of the dancers, projected by the Lumière Brothers.

Whether he observed the country dancers on stage or on screen, Degas here re-imagines them in an idyllic pastoral setting - a meadow at sunrise or sunset. Three women whirl and stomp to the rhythm of unseen music, ponytails streaming behind them and vermillion boots swinging out from beneath wide, flowing skirts.



Sharp cropping at the picture's edge enables us to imagine more dancers just out of view, perhaps forming a circle or line dance. Their emphatic movements suggest archaic rituals marking the rhythms of the seasons. Allegorical, rather than an image of 'reality,' the work reveals a shift from Degas's obsession with classical ballet towards a more experimental, symbolist approach. The pastels have been thickly applied and layered. According to Manet's niece Julie (daughter of the artist Berthe Morisot), Degas described creating 'orgies of colour'.

Did Degas know he was depicting Ukrainians? Did he recognise the national significance for the Ukraine of the blue and yellow ribbons and flowers twisted into the women's hair? It seems likely given that the same colours are juxtaposed in the hatching over the central figure's green skirt. Sadly however, the work has traditionally been known as 'Russian Dancers,' although it's not known who came up with this title and when. Before going on maternity leave, I'm proud to say my final achievement was to prompt the gallery to change the name of the painting from 'Russian Dancers' to 'Ukrainian Dancers', as that is almost certainly what they are! You might be surprised how often and how easily the titles of artworks are in fact changed, as new information arises or cultural trends shift, rendering a title inappropriate, old-fashioned, or inaccessible to gallery audiences. It can be as simple as changing the title on the website, wall label and collections management system. Sketches like this were rarely titled by the artist anyway, but retrospectively by curators, dealers, or auction houses. In this case, the work had long been referenced in the art literature as 'Russian Dancers', but it felt pedantic and wrong to adhere to this inaccuracy, particularly now. Thankfully, the relevant Curator and our Director agreed. Of course, the Ukraine belonged to the Russian Empire in the 1890s, but I hardly think we would give a Victorian painting of Indian dancers the title 'British Dancers' just because they were subjects of the British Raj!

'Ukrainian Dancers' is a celebration of spring and renewed life. As we enjoy the Morris dancing at the Jubilee party and Wakes Week, let's hold the Ukraine (and our Ukrainian visitors) in our thoughts and hope or pray for happier times ahead. Every sunrise is a new chance for peace.

Hello and welcome to the latest update from PCSO Mattison and PCSO Nixon. We are just about to begin our third quarterly priority of the year for the beat area which after monitoring the public's feedback from Derbyshire Alert Surveys will be Fraud.

In recent months we have seen an increased number of reports of courier fraud across Derbyshire, as well as nationally. This type of fraud can cause great emotional and financial stress and disproportionately affects older people, as fraudsters tend to target those who they perceive to be most vulnerable. In this article we go on to explain what courier fraud is, how you can spot the signs and what to do if you or someone you know falls victim to a scam.

What is courier fraud?

Courier fraud is when a fraudster contacts a victim by telephone pretending to be a police officer or bank official. To substantiate this claim, the caller might be able to confirm some easily obtainable basic details about the victim such as their full name and address. The fraudster then cons the victim into revealing their PIN and credit or debit card details.

Examples of courier fraud: A scammer calls you, claiming to be from your bank or a police officer. They tell you either that:

- a fraudulent payment has been spotted on your card that needs sorting out
- someone has been arrested using your details and cards

You may be asked to call your bank using the phone number on the back of your card. This convinces you that the call is genuine. But the scammer has kept the line open at their end, so when you make the call, you're unknowingly connected straight back to them or their friends.

They'll either ask you for your PIN or ask you to key it into your phone. No bank or other legitimate service will ever ask you for your PIN.

The scammer then sends a courier or taxi to pick up the card from your home. Even the driver may not know they're being used as part of the scam. Once the scammer has both your card and PIN they can spend your money.

A different version of this scam is where you're contacted and told there's a corrupt member of staff at your bank, post office or bureau de change and the police need your help to identify them.

They ask you to withdraw a large sum of your money, which the police or bank will mark, then put back into the banking system. They say this will help them identify the corrupt person. Once you hand the cash over, the scammers simply take it.

Another example is when a fake police officer phones or approaches you and asks you to buy an expensive watch or other high-value item, to try to find out if counterfeit goods are being sold.

Once you've bought the item, the scammer tells you to hand it to a taxi driver for transfer to the police. The expensive item is, of course, taken instead to the scammer's partner.

The latest variation is where the scammer contacts you and says your bank account has been taken over and you need to transfer all the funds into a 'safe account'. Of course, the new account is operated by the scammers, who then steal the funds.

If you receive such a call you should not give out any personal information and hang up the call immediately.

The police or your bank will never ask you to transfer money to a safe account for fraud or investigation reasons, even if they say it is in your name. The police or your bank will never send someone to your home to collect cash, pin, cards or cheque books

Fraudsters often target geographical areas where they know elderly or vulnerable people live, so we would ask that if you have family or friends who are vulnerable in any way that you make them aware of this scam.

If you, or someone you know, receives a call of this nature please contact us as soon as possible. We will then assess the area that is being targeted, alert the banks and endeavour to protect other local residents to prevent any financial loss.

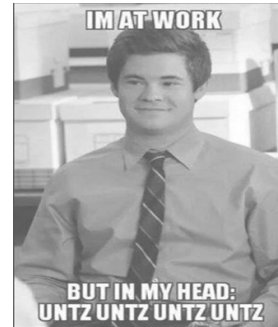

Letter from Reverend Stephen Monk
