Great Plant Sale!

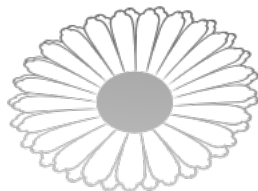

How it works

When you apply for the service, DCC will phone you to find out a bit about you, and to tell you more about how the service works. They will also ask you about what kind of things you'd like them to deliver. They will then arrange a visit to follow this up in more detail.

One of their home library assistants will then arrange to visit you once every 4 weeks.

They deliver to people in their own home as well as those in care homes.

Benefits include:

- free requests
- no charges on overdue books

Luncheon Club - perhaps you've heard of it but don't know how you can get involved.

As a volunteer-led club, it always needs people to host; people to provide entertainment - music, interesting talks or introductions to crafts, perhaps. Could that be you?

Or, does the idea of cooking one or two courses of a hot lunch in the comfort of your own kitchen appeal?

Catering for ~12-15 people once a month, expenses are paid for the food that you buy and prepare.

Menu can be varied and is determined by you, the 'chef', with a few food types that, due to allergies and dislikes, are off the menu. Good old british fayre goes down really well with the senior 'ladies and gentlemen' of the club.

Each time a car speeds through our village, the driver is giving no thought to you. No thought for your safety, or that of your loved ones, and no regard for the law of the land.

Winsters was not built with cars in mind. We all know the parking issues; we all know the lost wing mirrors and shunts as cars cannot stop in time.

Co-ordinating the Winsters Community Speedwatch has shown that most people support the initiative to keep the speeds down - we have 'Twenty's Plenty' signs around the village and ideally that

would be the designated speed.

Unfortunately we still see speeds far in excess of what is appropriate for our roads. The Parish Council is actively looking at measures that would be there 24/7. Your speedwatch team can't be there around the clock, but being visible periodically does remind people to slow down.

If your bank calls about fraud, ring them back on 159. Many financial frauds happen because credible-sounding scammers convince you that they are calling from your bank. There is now a simple way to protect against this. Virtually every UK bank is part of a new dial-159 scheme that will connect you to your bank's genuine Fraud team. If your caller really is from your bank, they won't mind you calling them back via 159.

Calling 159 (easy to remember: the buttons make a diagonal pattern) involves choosing which bank you are with, and then your call will go straight through to their Fraud team. 159 will never call you.

Don't dial the call immediately on the same phone line - scammers can sometimes keep the line open for up to three minutes in the hope that they can intercept your next call. Ideally, call 159 from a different phone line. Or, if you have to use the same line, make a quick call to a friend first, or wait for three minutes.

Wakes Week Hill Race – 2nd July 2026

Calling all runners and fun runners

The pre-registration for this year's Hill Race is open on-line by going to the village website

winster.org/pages/winster-hill-race

It's £5.00 for pre-entry or £8.00 on the night. You don't pay until you come to collect your number before the race, so it's cheaper to pre-enter. Pre-registration closes at 12 noon on 1st July.

Many Winsters residents and locals have done the race over the years and it's well worth entering whether you are a regular or it's a once only event. I fell into the latter category and came in a resounding last in my 50th year – but I'm still really glad I did it, and got a good cheer when I crossed the finish line. You wouldn't be the only one walking some stretches of Birchover and Dudwood Lanes, if you need a breather.

For those more competitive souls the course record currently stands at 22 minutes 30 seconds for the men and 25 minutes 54 seconds for women – can you beat it?

To enable us to hold this event within the Fell Runners Association guidance (and to be within the requirements of their insurance), entrants for the race must be 16 years old on race day or turn 16 by 31st December 2026.

Registration desks will be open outside the Market House as usual, from 5.45pm closing at 6.50pm, for runners to either enter on the night, or collect and pay for their number if they have pre-registered. Cash payments only please.

For those who permanently live within the Winsters Parish Boundary there is the additional chance to win the 'Fastest Local' trophy – so please join in if you can.

Wyn's Tor Singers Spring Concert

If you missed Wyn's Tor Singers' Spring Concert in Winster Church (May 9th) you missed out. With their usual mixture of classic references and popular melodies they entertained an enthusiastic audience for a delightful two hours. Add to that an appearance by world-class Spanish guitarist Graham Roberts, who has travelled the world and played with orchestras like the BBC Symphony, Royal National Scottish and the Pasadena Roof. After all that, he now lives (conveniently) in Crich and was delighted to perform in Winster.

Wyn's Tor were at their fluent best with alternative versions of pieces already in their repertoire. *O Magnum Mysterium* (Luis de Victoria), *Ave Maris Stella* (Grieg) and *Ubi Caritas* (Durufle) and an old favourite of mine, *Exultate Deo* (Scarlatti) showed off the maturing sound that the choir has been producing in recent concerts. Very calming after a busy day.

Graham Roberts played a set which included a piece by Villa-Lobos that I was hearing for the second time. The first time was when a friend played it on my first night at university sixty years ago. Graham's subtle rendering took me back there.

The choir then sang some Billy Joel, including *Goodnight My Angel*, a song which is fast becoming a signature tune. Paul Simon's *Bridge Over Troubled Water* ended a brilliant first half. All soothing balm for a Spring evening.

Unlike Greek tragedy, in the second half things didn't get worse – they got even better. More Graham Roberts' Spanish guitar, including some Paco Pena flamenco. From the choir, the beautiful *Sure on This Shining Night* (Lauridsen) and George Shearing's *Songs and Sonnets*, seven vocal works which use poems and songs from Shakespeare for text. Shearing set them in the 20th-century jazz style. Wyn's Tor were accompanied by Nigel Taylor on piano. The work premiered in Illinois in 1999 with the composer at the piano and John Rutter conducting. We didn't have to go any further than Winster Church.

The finale was Denza's *Funiculi Funicula*, a lively song that apparently commemorates the opening of the railway up Mount Vesuvius. Well, you live and learn!

Don't miss the next Wyn's Tor event. The Choir will be singing in Winster Church on July 19th at 4.30pm during Winster's Secret Gardens weekend.

The Vicar's June Message

Recently there has been much made of David Attenborough's 100th Birthday. Two things I like about him are: firstly, he's never lost a sense of wonder and awe at the beauty of our natural world. Secondly, he so often humbly reflects on that same beauty and wonder. Today I was in Tissington and I was moved by the amazing well dressings. As we enter the month of June, let us reflect on the significance of this month on the Christian calendar. The month of June brings with it a sense of renewal, growth, and new beginnings. It is a time of flowering of new growth in nature. This season of the year also marks the beginning of summer, a time of warmth and relaxation.

At the heart of June, however, lies a deeper spiritual significance. For Christians, June is often associated with the feast of St. John the Evangelist, one of the Apostles, who was the companion of Jesus. His feast day is celebrated on June 27th. Let us commemorate this month not just as a celebration of the natural world, but also as a time to deepen our own spiritual connection. Whether we are celebrating the new life of a child, the blossoming of new friendships, or simply the beauty of the world around us, let us remember that God is the source of all life and beauty. One of the great teachings of Jesus is found in the Gospel of John, particularly in Chapter 1, Verse 1. This verse states, "*In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God.*

He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not even one thing came into being. That which came into being through him is life, and his life is eternal. No one can snatch that life from him." (John 1:1-3, NIV) In the love of God we must take time to be aware of the Beauty around us and the Gifts God offers us if we take time to think and be still for a while.

This verse encapsulates the essence of Christian belief. Jesus, the Word made flesh, was in existence from the beginning of time. He was present when the universe was created, and through Him everything was brought into being. The life that He offers is eternal, and He protects it from any form of harm. In the month of June, let us reflect on this truth. Let us seek to live in the light of Jesus, to let His light shine through us, bringing warmth, healing, and hope to those around us. Let us be instruments of His love, spreading joy, kindness, and understanding wherever we go. As we move into this month, may we be reminded of our own invitation to eternal life through faith in Jesus Christ. As St. John's gospel continues, "*For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him.*" (John 3:16-17, NIV)

Part 2 of the history of Winster's Darby and Joan Club, which this year celebrates its 70th anniversary.

Winster Darby and Joan club. Established 1956 - part 2

In the 80s, meetings were fortnightly at The Manor. Christmas dinners were held at locations including the Fishpond & Temple Hotel Matlock Bath, The Miners Standard & Winster Hall. Tommy, Malcom & Rex Concannon brothers entertained at the Miners Standard.

Many holidays were taken in the 80s to Torquay, Eastbourne and Cliftonville, organised by my mother, Evelyn Tunnicliffe, who had taken on the roll of leader with Gwen McManus & Joyce Fletcher.

The Burton Institute was cold and damp and members would not attend in the cold weather so meetings were then moved to the Hairdressers from 1987. Day trips and parties continued into the 90s but membership dwindled as members sadly passed away.

Gwen & Joyce retired and Grace Bacon and Brian Long took over as Secretary and Treasurer.

When my mother, Evelyn Tunnicliffe, passed away in 1999, I took on the leadership role. We have continued and still have trips out with Alan Pursglove driving the Bakewell and Eyam Community bus. We have held Christmas dinners at the Bowling Green and more recently at the Burton Institute, run and cooked by Carol Ashin with entertainment provided by Eric Black.

In 2013 I, along with Carol, Brian, Jackie, Grace Bacon and Anne Bacon attended St Paul's Cathedral to celebrate the 75th anniversary of the RVS service.

The club has had so much help and support over the years from David & Marilyn at the Bowling Green, Heathcote Charity, Carnival & Secret Gardens Committee, not forgetting the Guisers.

I would like to say a big thank you to all, past and present; people who have helped to keep our village club running.

What a wonderful achievement to remember Winster Darby and Joan which has been a constant in Winster for the past 70 years.
